The Academy of European Law

The Academy of European Law, at the European University Institute (EUI) in Florence, promotes teaching and scholarship in the fields of European Union Law and Human Rights Law through its summer courses, research projects and publications programme.

The Directors of the Academy are Professors Loïc Azoulay, Nehal Bhuta and Marise Cremona.

Courses

Each year the Academy holds two summer courses, one on Human Rights Law and the other on European Union Law.

Each course includes Distinguished Lectures, a General Course, and a series of Specialized Courses; participants attend all of these. The General Course is given by an eminent scholar who either examines the field as a whole through a particular thematic, conceptual or philosophical lens or explores a particular theme in the context of the overall body of law in the field. The Specialized Courses focus on a topical theme, which ensures that the programme is at the cutting edge of current legal issues.

Courses are held every day from Monday to Friday and attendance is compulsory. A certificate of attendance is issued at the end of the two weeks.

Languages

The courses are held in English, so you need to have a strong command of English (level B2 of the Common European Framework Guidelines is recommended, but certification is not required).

Eligibility

The courses are for advanced students of law or related fields, including lawyers, specialists, practitioners, professors, researchers and students.

Applicants should hold at least a 3-year law degree or have completed at least 4 years of university studies, which must have included lectures on international law and/or EU Law. Undergraduates may apply but are accepted only in exceptional circumstances.

Enrolment numbers are limited and admission is based on merit.

Enrolment Fees

There is an enrolment fee of €650 for each course, payable on acceptance of a place. The fee is €950 for those attending both courses. This fee covers tuition, reading materials, coffee breaks, and lunches at the university cafeteria. Participants may use the EUI library during the course. The fee does not cover travel and accommodation.

In the event of cancellation before the course starts, 75% of the enrolment fee will be reimbursed.

Fee waivers

A very limited number of fee waivers are awarded at the discretion of the Directors of the Academy and are based on need and merit. Applicants who need a fee waiver should send a short email explaining their situation to academy@eui.eu by 1 April 2014.

Accommodation and Insurance

Participants arrange their own accommodation. The Academy provides information on hotels and other accommodation to successful candidates.

The Academy does not provide medical insurance and cannot cover medical fees. Participants are advised to purchase international medical insurance in their home country before leaving.

Application

In addition to completing the online application form (available on the Academy's website: www.eui.eu/AEL), applicants must ensure that a reference letter is sent to the Academy by a professor or employer. Please do not submit other materials, such as copies of diplomas or publications.

The deadline for applications is 10 April 2014. Applications must be in English.

Candidates will be notified of the outcome of their application by 10 May 2014 at the latest. Please contact us if you do not hear anything by that date.

Diploma of the Academy

Participants who already have advanced knowledge in the fields of European Union law and/or Human Rights law may choose to sit the Academy's examinations.
